Lectionary readings for Christ the King / Reign of Christ Sunday November 23, 2025

> Jeremiah 23:1-6 Psalm 46 Colossians 1:11-20 Luke 23:33-43

When they came to the place called "The Skull," they nailed the hands and feet of Creator Sets Free (Jesus) to a tree pole -the cross. They did the same for the two criminals, putting one on each side of him. "Father, forgive them!" Creator Sets Free cried out. "They do not know what they are doing." Luke 23: 33-34 First Nations Version

The Christian Year ends this Sunday with Luke's account of Jesus' Crucifixion. Christ the King and The Reign of Christ are two of the names we use to refer to this holy day. Keeping with the tradition of changing "kingdom" to "Kin-dom," I like to hold the name "Christ our Kin" this Sunday. When we open ourselves to grace, attending to the suffering in the world, we truly meet Jesus as "kin" and king. We taste the kin-dom of Jesus in this life.

Jesus proclaimed a Kin-dom of God that takes place on earth, among the poor and oppressed, not only in some great beyond. He contradicted any expectation that he would bring a violent restoration of Davidic Monarchy.

How is it that a man publicly executed as a traitor could also be king? Thorns a crown? Dying words a promise of walking together in the garden? "The fatal torture of a helpless criminal is not most people's idea of a coronation ceremony." (Garnaas Holmes)

Yet, that's exactly the point. Jesus is not the nationalistic king people expected. He does not oppress, he liberates. He neither manipulates nor coerces his followers for his way is love and "love does not insist on its own way." He rules in gentleness and mercy. Even with the last breaths he drew on earth, Jesus asked for forgiveness upon the soldiers and religious leaders attending his murder that they coordinated.

By Jesus' example we can despise systems of oppression and love our people. We can hold leaders accountable as a way of loving our people. United Methodist churches work to meet our neighbors' basic needs because God cares about 'daily bread,' and the 'kindom' come on earth. We also work for the more-than-human kin we share the planet with. In humbly following Christ we need to see ourselves as members of the whole community of creation. Jesus' kin-dom invites us to abide by rules that allow all people and life to flourish.

May we continually return to give thanks, yes, lament, and heal.

"Behold, your king is coming to you; He is just and endowed with salvation, humble, and mounted on a donkey, Even on a colt, the foal of a donkey." Zechariah 9:9.

# Tuesday Morning Meditation



#### Weekly on Tuesday Log Cabin or Online 10:30 AM CDT

Join us as we gather to practice Lectio divina on the weekly lectionary readings.

**Lectio divina** is a contemplative practice with its Christian roots in the Benedictine tradition. It combines slow, conscious

reading of a biblical or sacred text with contemplation and silent prayer. It is meant to promote communication with God and a deeper knowledge of Christ, in our lives today.

During Lectio Divina we put aside thoughts of studying the text. This is not the time to consider the historical or theological meanings of what we are reading.

We read with a willingness to enter into text in a felt sense. The purpose of this practice is to hear, in silence, the word of God, in this moment. What, through this reading, is God saying to me right now? What do I hear that helps me know what it means to walk the Christ path today?

Lectio Divina has traditionally been a communal practice; that is, one shared when in a group but it can be done when alone.
