

Lectionary readings for
October 12, 2025
Eighteenth Sunday after Pentecost:
Jeremiah 29:1, 4-7
Psalm 66:1-12
2 Timothy 2:8-15
Luke 17:11-19

God made us a people on the move. Migration is as natural as nature itself. Our Christian story literally begins with Abraham and Sarah leaving their home at God's request.

The pages of scripture pulsate with the stories of God's will made clear to immigrants, refugees, and sojourners. Think of Ruth and Boaz, Joseph, Jonah, the Apostles! Just after his birth, Jesus' own family trusted God to cross a border, fleeing violence.

Following Christ means that you inherited your faith from migrants who came before you. Our ancestors encountered God on the move. Jesus himself was an immigrant and a refugee.

Jesus gave us the answer sheet to the exam for entering the Kin-dom of heaven, saying 'I was a stranger, and you welcomed me.' These are his words to those who inherit eternal life. For those whose law is love, Jesus in 'the stranger' includes refugees, the displaced, people whose legal status may be uncertain in our day.

God's command to the people in Leviticus 19:33-34 rings loud and clear during this time of actions and rhetoric against immigrants: 'When a foreigner resides among you in your land, do not mistreat them. 34 The foreigner residing among you must be treated as your native-born. Love them as yourself, for you were foreigners in Egypt. I am the Lord your God.'

May we entertain angels unawares in our warm welcome in person, in policy, in public.



When Sally Vonner was interviewed in 2023 in a "Faith Talks" (FT) podcast, she talked about love and faith in action. Here are some of the questions and answers from that podcast with Jennifer R. Farmer.

JF: In this new capacity, what will be your primary focus? Sally Vonner: My primary focus is to continue to expand United Women in Faith's mission and reach as we put our love and faith in action to change the world, and work to improve the lives of women, children, and youth around the world. My leadership style will be characterized by faith and trust in God, and inclusivity. I will draw upon the wisdom and ingenuity of our membership, the board of directors, the Program Advisory Group, and my colleagues.

JF: Why are you being installed in Dallas versus New York City where United Women in Faith is headquartered?

Sally Vonner: While the organization is headquartered in New York, I wanted the ceremony to be held in Dallas where I am from and be accessible to more members, family and friends. It is important to me that my leadership be grounded in our members. I am sending a message that I will lead this organization with values of inclusivity, compassion, and innovation.

JF: Can you talk more about your philosophy on leadership? Sally Vonner: Regardless of the title one holds, leadership is a communal process. We rise and fall together. Great leaders seek counsel and that's what I intend to do – center the wisdom and ingenuity of our membership and include their perspectives on matters great and small.



Tuesday Morning Meditation



Weekly on Tuesday Log Cabin or Online 10:30 AM CDT

Join us as we gather to practice Lectio divina on the weekly lectionary readings.

Lectio divina is a contemplative practice with its Christian roots in the Benedictine tradition. It combines slow, conscious

reading of a biblical or sacred text with contemplation and silent prayer. It is meant to promote communication with God and a deeper knowledge of Christ, in our lives today.

During Lectio Divina we put aside thoughts of studying the text. This is not the time to consider the historical or theological meanings of what we are reading. We read with a willingness to enter into text in a felt sense. The purpose of this practice is to hear, in silence, the word of God, in this moment. What, through

this reading, is God saying to me right now? What do I hear that helps me know what it means to walk the Christ path today?

Lectio Divina has traditionally been a communal practice; that is, one shared when in a group but it can be done when alone.

Below is a list of suggested items - because the Mini Food Pantry is outside, it's important to only contribute non-perishable items, such as:




- <u>Canned goods</u> with ring-pulls

Nobel Peace Prize Laureates His Holiness the Dalai Lama and Archbishop Desmond Tutu have survived more than fifty years of exile and the soul-crushing violence of oppression. Despite their hardships—or, as they would say, because of them—they are two of the most joyful people on the planet.

happiness. Throughout, they include stories, wisdom, and science. Finally, they share their daily Joy Practices that anchor their own emotional and spiritual lives.

The Archbishop has never claimed sainthood, and the Dalai Lama considers himself a simple monk. In this unique collaboration, they offer us the reflection of real lives filled with pain and turmoil in the midst of which they have been able to discover a level of peace, of courage, and of joy to which we can all aspire in our own lives.
