January 4, 2026

Jeremiah 31:7-14 Psalm 147:12-20
Ephesians 1:3-14 John 1:1-18

Beloveds,

Merry 9th Day of Christmas! I hope you still take time to ponder the mystery of Christmas each day.

We are blessed to have Antoinette Senjanovich, LCSW, preaching and leading in worship with me on Sunday. Ms. Senjanovich is a first-year student at Garrett Evangelical Theological Seminary. She is a clinical therapist, social worker, and candidate for ordained ministry in the United Methodist Church.

In preparation for Sunday, she and I discussed our Wesleyan heritage: our music and traditions. She selected meaningful hymns for this time of year. Part of her message reminds us of the Methodist New Year's tradition of observing a Watch Night. Historically, it is a time for renewing our baptismal vows and covenant to God.

You may recall that John Wesley's ministry to the poor was considered scandalous by the 18th century religious elites. The word "Methodist" was an insult that this new group of social and spiritual activists embraced. Wesley was, himself, both horrified and in awe of God's summons to serve coal miners, dock workers and the imprisoned; people excluded from the decorum and order of church life.

In 2025, the United Methodist Church released this new motto to guide our work: **"Love boldly. Serve Joyfully. Lead Courageously."**

A passionate love of God, neighbors and self enables us to resist evil and oppression. As we see God's image in all people, we are less likely to objectify others. With God's bold love, we can overcome the evil in our own hearts and stand up as we reclaim our Wesleyan roots.

Serving joyfully, we walk with our Methodist ancestors, past and present. We have a long and storied history of siding with the vulnerable. With God's help, we can be more Christ-like in our compassion. We can overcome the evil in the world.

The landscape of church life continues to shift and change. Leading courageously means that we will be reliable, persistent and seek to unite as we move the church into deeper discipleship and spiritual growth. Our forerunners in the faith turned the church upside-down. They took risks that threatened their reputation and safety. For inviting women to speak, visiting prisoners, singing hymns in public and

denouncing slavery at a time when the Atlantic slave trade was at its peak, early Methodists, like John's brother, Charles, were assaulted and arrested.

By God's grace, United Methodists today are empowered to lead the church outside its own comfort zone, to be relevant, and to make prophetic calls for justice and mercy. We resolve to continue to offend people by our proclamation of the God who loves the poor, the queer, the undocumented and the unhoused. We resolve to cling to the love of Jesus amidst bitterness and hate and the chaos they bring in 2026.

Let a spiritual fire blaze in our Church, Lord, so that we are not domesticated, "a dead sect having the form of religion without the power."

Tuesday Morning Meditation



**Weekly on Tuesday
Log Cabin or Online
10:30 AM CDT**

Join us as we gather to practice Lectio Divina on the weekly lectionary readings.

Lectio Divina is a contemplative practice with its Christian roots in the Benedictine tradition. It combines slow, conscious reading of a biblical or sacred text with contemplation and silent prayer.

It is meant to promote communication with God and a deeper knowledge of Christ, in our lives today.

During Lectio Divina we put aside thoughts of studying the text. This is not the time to consider the historical or theological meanings of what we are reading. We read with a willingness to enter into text in a felt sense. The purpose of this practice is to hear, in silence, the word of God, in this moment. What, through this reading, is God saying to me right now? What do I hear that helps me know what it means to walk the Christ path today?

Lectio Divina has traditionally been a communal practice; that is, one shared when in a group but it can be done when alone.
