
Central United Methodist Church August 31, 2025



Lectionary readings for Twelfth Sunday after Pentecost:

Jeremiah 2:4-13 Psalm 81:1, 10-16 Hebrews 13:1-8, 15-16 Luke 14:1, 7-14

"Don't forget to do good and to share what you have because God is pleased with these kinds of sacrifices." Hebrews 13:16 Recently, I read a warning for residents to lock their cars in August and September. Doors left open run the risk of intruders leaving zucchini on the seat.

During this late summer season, growers know the joy and pressure to do something with all the harvest. The kitchen counters in my home are covered with herbs and garlic drying out, bowls of tomatoes ripening (yes, we pick them unripe, before the squirrel-monsters take bites), bags of fresh beans, squash, and peppers. It is a delight. And it is a frustration. We have to act fast to cook, preserve, or give away this brief abundance.

It seems like late summer only gives us a few weeks to take in the harvest from all of spring and summer's work of planting and tending the garden. It's busy and hectic work, and also wonderful. There's nothing quite like finding tasty morsels growing on the vine. Thankfully, our garden is small and diverse enough that the work doesn't feel laborious.

The joy gardeners derive from sharing from their gardens is a huge bonus. We often know which relatives and friends will get the greatest satisfaction from our labors. A gift as simple as cucumbers, tomatoes, basil, or blackberries communicates such love. Sharing honors the Creator's plan of abundance.

Wealth, according to Robin Wall Kimmerer, is having enough to share. Relationships and gratitude are the currency of a gift economy. Sharing from abundance fosters well-being rather than accumulation. Gratitude creates fullness, which defies our current economy that relies on our emptiness and unmet desires. God delights in our sharing.

When Sally Vonner was interviewed in 2023 in a "Faith Talks" podcast, she talked about love and faith in action. Here are some of the questions and answers from that podcast with Jennifer R. Farmer (JF).

JF: Can you talk more about your philosophy on leadership? Sally Vonner: Regardless of the title one holds, leadership is a communal process. We rise and fall together. Great leaders seek counsel and that's what I intend to do – center the wisdom and ingenuity of our membership and include their perspectives on matters great and small.

Weekly on Tuesday Starting September 9 Log Cabin or Online 10:30 AM CDT

Join us as we gather to practice Lectio divina on the weekly lectionary readings.

Lectio divina is a contemplative practice with its Christian roots in the

Benedictine tradition. It combines slow, conscious reading of a biblical or sacred text with contemplation and silent prayer. It is meant to promote communication with God and a deeper knowledge of Christ, in our lives today.

During Lectio Divina we put aside thoughts of studying the text. This is not the time to consider the historical or theological meanings of what we are reading. We read with a willingness to enter into text in a felt sense. The purpose of this practice is to hear, in silence, the word of God, in this moment. What, through this reading, is God saying to me right now? What do I hear that helps me know what it means to walk the Christ path today?

Lectio Divina has traditionally been a communal practice; that is, one shared when in a group but it can be done when alone.

Please do not bring any containers - empty jars, etc.


Below is a list of suggested items - because the Mini Food Pantry is outside, it's important to only contribute non-perishable items, such as:
